What's Going On?

Plans have been filed to remove a 120year old Giant Seguoia in Green Lake for a driveway.

An AIA certified architect has reviewed the plan and confirmed that the same housing and parking could be built with small design changes. However, the city construction department, SDCI, will not request these changes to save the tree.

Preserving large trees is critical to Seattle's resiliency against heat and extreme weather, but Seattle has almost no tree protections for properties undergoing construction.
